

**Being based on the North Kingston site comments received from the new secondary school consultation**

- Having two secondary schools next to each other could create animosity between the pupils at two schools leading to bullying & possibly anti social behaviour. - It would be far too many schools next to each other
It is absolutely vital that there is a secondary school based in North Kingston
Not sure where this is but if next to Tiffin girls seems ok
The site is TOO small, even with clever design
"Clustering" encourages/reinforces local reputation
1. 5 stories is unacceptable for a school; 2. The site seems very cramped and unfriendly for a big school; 3. An 8 form entry is too big, consider smaller schools as well; 4. The location is poorly accessible for residents in the eastern wards of North Kingston (Coombe Hill Schools catchment); 5. No allowance seems to have been made for the relocation of the facilities being demolished.
1. The site is not big enough. Inappropriate to be so close to Fern Hill when space is so limited. 3. Because of restrictions in routes due to the river and Richmond Park, Richmond Road cannot take more traffic - already impossible around 9am and 3pm. 4. Adult Education must remain in North Kingston
8 Form seems rather excessive ...6 form more acceptable for the resources currently available
a Co-ed secondary school would be highly sort after through the borough
A good site but I am slightly concerned about lost learning time with pupils walking to the Hawker Centre playing fields for PE. Will the school day be longer to compensate
A new school should be in a more deprived area - to allow for social integration and bring different sets of values to poorer less educated parents.
A non selective comp next to Tiffin Girls is ridiculous leading to rivalry and fighting. The local infrastructure especially transport, is utterly inadequate.
A smaller school may be viable but only if the traffic implications are addressed.
A school on the NK site will cause increasingly congested Richmond Road and the adjacent roads, increasing pollution, and damaging the facilities offered by the Hawker Centre
A school with appropriate dimensions that shows the planned intake will completely dominate the area and the surrounding dwellings. The site is just not big enough for what is proposed without significant adverse impact on the local neighbourhood.
Absolutely outrageous to take land from Tiffin Girls and building a school next door is asking for trouble. Also the local infrastructure cannot support it.
additional traffic and pollution with all staff + pupils + parents
Adjacent to TGS is potentially problematic. Changes in bus frequency down Richmond Road would need to be extensive.
Adult education site needs to be addressed well before planning goes ahead-

school. Hence they should choose another site for the new school.
Already too many schools leading to traffic chaos - promotion of walking is wishful thinking! Reducing adult education facilities in the borough to NIL Monopolising the HC to the detriment of current users. WHERE ARE THE ALTERNATIVES?
Alternative provision should be made for the users of the adult learning centre. It seems to be well supported and should continue
Although I think a new school should be sited in North Kingston, I feel the proposal of the site next to Tiffin Girls to be too small for an 8-form entry school. I am strongly opposed to any loss of land from Tiffin Girls due to a new neighbouring school. I would suggest that the Hawker Centre is a more sensible option on which to place a large secondary school.
Although it seems to be me that Coombe Girls is going to struggle in due course too as the number of children in New Malden coming up through primary schools is increasing vastly.
Although there are a lot of schools in close proximity it is a good choice and its current usage can be adequately relocated

As long as it uses buildings already there so that the money saved can be spent on teachers and resources. There is no point in having a new building if there aren't enough text books to go round! Sounds obvious but many schools in the borough have precisely this problem.
As long as the current building is used not knocked down. As long as pathway between Tiffin Girls and NKC is not removed
As long as there is enough space for play and sport. Without a balanced education i.e. learning and sport combined, there is more chance of failing the individual in his progression through life
As long the services that are provided at present site are not lost!
As mentioned before, the school will be too large and have an impact on the area/roads
As mentioned previously, safety concerns with very large school and road, plus travel to offsite sports facilities. Would like to know more about plans for sustainable travel arrangements, to minimise vehicular impact, cycle lanes etc. would like to see this published and made publicly available asap
As my garden backs on to the NKC my main concern is the height of the school (5 storeys!!)
As obviously not enough secondary school places available at the moment, a new secondary public school is thoroughly recommended
As stated previously, far too large for this site, not in terms of building space but on the practical aspects of a school of this magnitude being build in this area.
As stated, 2 schools-one for boys and one for girls or 2/3 additional coeducational schools would be better. If there are 1800 student going to one place at one time and leaving one place at one time there will be congestion issue. How will student get to the school? Surely the limited bus routes will

struggle to cope with the demand?
As there is already on that bus route, Greycourt, Fern hill, Tiffin and other small nursery schools, this will mean very clogged up buses and Richmond Road will be even heavier on traffic on parents evening and open evenings/days
As Tiffin Girls take only 40% of local children I suggest they be moved and given an equivalent building and land out of N Kingston and the site could then be used to renovate and build an 8FE as proposed.
As mentioned it is too small for a secondary school on N Kingston Site
Assuming due consideration given to users of the site and effect on the area
Awful site placement - schools like Tiffin which are among the best performing in the country need to preserve and maintain all of their facilities - to eat into it would put them at a disadvantage and the quality of education at a disadvantage. I would reconsider sending my daughters to Tiffin despite their academic potential if any of their sites was to be taken away. From what I understand things like their astro turf will be eaten into and as mentioned this puts the schools attractiveness to potential parents and students at a much further disadvantage and would make me think twice.

Best available, probably, especially if the local authority can expand the site.

best of a bad choice since the council sold off other suitable sites few years ago
Better use of space
Bring yobbism and anti social behaviour to the area and undermine Tiffin Girls
Building a large secondary school next to two other schools will have a huge impact on local traffic. also the lack of grounds for the school is very unsatisfactory
But am very concerned about the impact on already congested travel routes. Your travel plan does not mention improved cycle routes and makes no MENTION of additional bus routes, which I believe are ESSENTIAL
But may feel differently if live there
But not in Richmond Road - there are already 2 schools in the immediate area
But ONLY if it starts life in the existing building. Tiffin (Boys) is an older building and seems to function very well? If used, the building could accommodate the 'required' number of pupils and grow organically and may prove that 8 classes are not necessary.
But sire must include adequate car parking for staff and pupils to prevent overspill onto local roads
But the site is too small for the proposed school size. Need to consider how facilities at Tiffin Girls and boys are utilised. Also need to consider entry requirements at these schools.
But was the former Dysart Special School site inappropriate?
Can the new school offer space for evening and weekend classes to adults? Surely, this benefits everyone.
Central or southern Kingston is preferred
Children would not have enough room to move on this sight. E.g. No playgroups, Too many to a class room and education levels will drop.
Clearly, finding a suitable site will be a challenge but it will not be met by selecting a site as clearly unsuitable as the one being proposed. On that stretch of road running between Kingston ("K") and Richmond ("R") there are already several schools in addition to Tiffin Girls' School, Greycourt, the German School and Fern hill but the pedestrian congestion caused by those schools alone around the bus and train stations in R and K is already troubling at key times of day in terms of ensuring the safety (let alone comfort or convenience) of young and old alike. The proposed addition of more pupils will

materially increase hazard, place an unsupportable burden on public transport (including, the notoriously lamentable number 65 and 371 buses), clog up that often narrow and winding, residential road with traffic (with greatly increased numbers of buses and private cars) and pollution. It will be stressful, time consuming and potentially hazardous for the children attempting to travel to and from school. It is not difficult to foresee huge inconvenience to local inhabitants, shop keepers and road users arising in the event of over one thousand school children being added and only too foreseeable to have flashpoints arising with such numbers milling around the area.

don't know enough about the site to comment
Don't know the statistical details on which the decision is being made. Why North Kingston? Does the statistical data support the selection of site? How the existing schools and the students of those schools will be affected should be considered before choosing the site. Has it been done?
Easily accessible by road, car, bus cycle and rail. Doesn't appear to be a better alternative site in Kingston and the school is desperately needed
Essential that there is a secondary school on the North Kingston site.
Establishing another secondary school next to Tiffin Girls school will create havoc on Richmond Road. Traffic is a major problem already, not to mention the buses that go full with Tiffin Girls/Tiffin Boys/Kingston Grammar school kids
Even the Ham area needs a Secondary School
Everybody agrees north Kingston needs a new school. First find a suitable area to build a school
extremely worried about increase in traffic
FAR FROM IDEAL SITE
Far too big - the surrounding area of the proposed site cannot cope with such a huge school, in-between two other schools, by a main road and with no playing fields.
Far too busy a site already.
Far too many constraints on public transport and access to North Kingston which will increase with such a large school
find a larger plot nearer Kingston town
For the proposed school to be built on the North Kingston site, the classes per year have to be

reduced. The infrastructure of the area cannot possibly cope with the extra demand put upon it for accessing Tiffin Girls, the new school and Fern hill Primary. The possibility of c.3, 270 pupils and c.300 staff accessing the three sites is frightening. (900 girls, Tiffin, 1,700 for new school and 670 pupils if Fern Hill goes ahead with its expansion programme. There also has to be concerns that in order for this school to go ahead it requires land from Tiffin Girls. How can this be right? Tiffin Girls are hardly awash with spare land as it is. Are you planning to build on their hockey pitch or netball courts which are a vital amenity? These facilities are also used by local sporting clubs (VITAL). You cannot consider building upon them, it would be criminal.
Given the limited options available within the borough accept that this is a logical location for a new school. Have deep reservations about the ability of this site to accommodate an eight form entry school.
Given the limited options I accept this seems the logical choice - but the constrained size of this site needs to be reflected in your plans
Good bus route existing crossing adequate green space
Good use of space, there aren't really any other feasible sites in the area
Great if you drive.
Grey Court is only school in the area. Hollyfield is an hour and 2 buses away
Ground should not be taken away from the Tiffin Girls School this is unfair as it would leave them with even smaller sport facilities.
Had bad experience of comprehensive school in the area some years ago
Harsh to dislocate the adult learning. This is important. Also safety aspects for the primary school that already exists. I will expand later.
Have reservations re sports facilities off site but if HC has playing fields, this is a reasonable compromise
Having attended the public meeting on Jan 9th it would appear because of the way this joint scheme with Croydon is to be funded there is absolutely no flexibility in this scheme. It seems whatever the majority opinion of this scheme is we local residents are expected to put up with it come what may. Given the choice of an 8 form entry school, or no school, I would have to vote for the latter
Highly disruptive, will create additional noise and chaotic traffic congestion. Parking in residential side roads is sure to be affected. The council cannot stop pupils travelling by car; it has failed to do so at other schools in the Borough.
Hopefully good working and social relationships will be built with neighbouring schools
How can 3 schools and their staff arrive and depart at similar times in an already congested major traffic route and densely residential area? It would be detrimental to one of this country's most outstanding schools as well as very young children at the primary school.
How can so many pupils/students occupy such a small stretch of land - where there will be 2 secondary schools and an expanding primary school? Put the new secondary school elsewhere!
However I DO NOT believe the centre should be expanded.
However there are concerns if the site is going to be expanded. The amount of additional traffic but human, cars and buses needs to be taken into account as Richmond Road is already busy at Peak times.
However transport from the Kingston centre to the school needs to be considered. Children get free bus travel and currently Tiffin Girls fill up the buses before they leave Kingston, stopping commuters and other passengers getting on at the stops between Kingston and the school. With another school, I fear the situation could get even worse than the 20-30min/3-4 bus wait that is sometimes experienced.
However we hope this doesn't disadvantage families who live in central and south Kingston. Would be good to know what the selection criteria would be
However, it would be better if the school were to be smaller than 8 forms of entry.
Huge number of pupils on the road.
I can't decide if this is the right site. My feeling is there is not enough space for the proposed number of forms of entry.
I agree but only if it is a smaller school - an 8 form entry is too big for that site.
I agree that a school is needed in this area but it's a shame that it isn't going to help Kingston pupils

who live in the south of the borough who also struggle for decent school places.
I agree that more places are needed but instead of a new school, would prefer to have Greycourt expanded. Liaise with Richmond Council!
I am appalled that this site is being considered for this purpose when no alternative site is being suggested at this stage for the numerous adult education classes that currently take place there. This is after all the main college for Kingston Adult Education & where its management are based. Despite having been attending multiple continuous courses at the North Kingston Adult Education Centre this is the first time I was aware of a consultation. This doesn't seem right given that I have read in the yellow booklet with the 'hard (paper) copy' of this form that "an informal consultation" took place between July-September 2009 in which people were able to view their opinion on using the North Kingston centre for a new secondary school. I don't understand why people like me who are heavy users of the North Kingston centre for Adult Education weren't invited to give their opinion then. If a new school goes ahead on this site, it should be ensured that the new site has the same facilities for Adult Education as the North Kingston centre: at least 3 tennis courts, a sports hall, a refectory, Learning Centre etc. And the school should be used in the evening & at week-ends for Adult Education as at a state school in Esher (& I know Grey Court state School in Ham has a tennis club for adults in the evening).
I am concerned about a. public transport/extra traffic issues, the sharing of resources between the new school and the schools next door, the tensions that may arise having two secondary schools (one of which is exam entry only) side by side!
I am concerned that an 8 form entry secondary school on the NK site between Fern hill primary school and Tiffin Girls school will cause severe congestion and traffic problems at the start and end of the school day.
I am concerned that pupils at Tiffin Girls may lose open space the their current parking provision
I am concerned that the already busy area will be able to cope with the increase in traffic both cars and pedestrians. It is a BIG concern. There is already an increase in traffic with just the "bulge" classes at Fern Hill School. There will be 3 large schools very close together, already at school start/finish times there is heavy traffic.
I am concerned that this may mean Richmond's pupils may take up a significant number of places
I am disabled and use a wheelchair. Please do not make my attendance at the NK site more difficult
I am extremely concerned about the traffic implication of having 2 secondary school and 1 primary school dependant on a single stretch of road, which is also vulnerable to any road works or incidents in Kingston town centre have we have had in recent weeks
I am not convinced that better use could not have been made at Greycourt although I know this is another borough
I am not sure if that is the only site to use. The Council needs to demonstrate that it does not have other options in terms on expanding other schools or whether other single sites would be just as effective.
I am sure many, many residents are dreading the arrival of even more traffic into a so called "conservation area". There MUST be other, more suitable sites in the area. At entrance examination time at Tiffin School there is total chaos in the area for days on end - an unbearable situation which would be exacerbated by yet another building so near
I am very concerned about Health and Safety of children. There would be too many children on the Richmond Road travelling at the same time leading to even more travel problems and increased congestion. The 65 bus is already unsatisfactory and unreliable; many more would be needed if a new school opened on the North Kingston Site. Staggering school times would not be realistic and neighbouring households would have increased range of times of traffic for the beginning and end of the school day. There is insufficient space at the North Kingston Site for eight form entry school. Conditions would be cramped. For Health and Safety the new building would have to be probably five storeys high given the area of land available. Taking land from Tiffin Girls' School would mean their sporting facilities would be decreased. Did they not fund raise for those facilities? Did not Sport England support their work? How will they be compensated for the loss of land? How will they be compensated for the loss of sports facilities? The communities using those facilities will also lose out. Building work brings with it site traffic and noise over a long period of time. This is not good for the residents in Richmond Road, the pupils of Fern Hill Primary nor for the pupils of Tiffin Girls' School. The

<p>education of these children could suffer. The number of staff travelling in for three schools would add to the traffic problems. Some may live too far to walk or cycle. They may not be served by good bus routes into Kingston. More cars would need to be used than at present. The Council must have some idea of the facilities a new school needs to have and how much space each child requires for their wellbeing - the North Kingston site is too small for eight form entry. This may affect the children adversely - emotionally and psychologically. Bullying may become an issue. Can Royal Borough of Kingston meet with/negotiate/liase/talk to Richmond Borough Council about land available for a new school within Richmond? Or perhaps, Christ's School or Grey Court being developed to receive more of the North Kingston children? It would be a good opportunity for the two councils to help each other out and improve the education of the children in the long-term rather than Kingston grasping an ill-advised solution pushed through because of a funding deadline. I do want a good future education for all children and I think it would be better if the new school was not built on the North Kingston site.</p>
<p>I am very concerned about the increased number of pupils and staff on the site and the effect of this on the transport infrastructure in the area. I am also worried about the plans for this north Kingston centre site which is very small in size</p>
<p>I am worried about the resulting traffic gridlock on the Richmond Road- its bed enough already due to educational centres already there. Plus through traffic from Kingston.</p>
<p>I am worried that the present users of the site will not in fact be re-housed suitably. Until the premises to be used have been agreed the school should not move in. That said, I would like to see the 'museum' users of the North Kingston Centre housed in the same building as the museum proper.</p>
<p>I assume this is the best site identified locally</p>
<p>I believe the playing fields opposite Latchmere School is prime site which could have been considered earlier</p>
<p>I believe the proposed site to be totally inappropriate for a development of this scale. Adjacent to two existing schools there is likely to be a major increase in the volume of traffic on this already and potentially dangerous stretch of road.</p>
<p>I believe the proposed site to be totally unsuitable for a project of this scale and one which will inevitably cause a major increase in traffic on what is already a very busy and potentially dangerous stretch of road.</p>
<p>I cannot comment on the direct need for NK site to be used but in principle the need for an additional school seems sound</p>
<p>I cannot see any reason why the school has to be located in North Kingston. I am very worried that by locating the new school in North Kingston it will have an adverse affect on Grey Court.</p>
<p>I cannot see how this site - with an existing secondary and primary school, which cause severe congestion already - can accommodate a further 2000 pupils (1680 secondary and an additional 210 for Fern hill). The bus service is notoriously bad and Fern hill's green travel plans are not practised by the parents. The footpaths between here and Kingston are also very narrow.</p>
<p>I certainly think that North Kingston needs a secondary school. Indeed it had one, Tudor School. It would be better to move Tiffin Girls to the centre of Kingston, more travel connections and re-open the secondary school where it is</p>
<p>I disagree with proposal of facilities near the river i.e. Hawker Centre</p>
<p>I disagree with this site being used for an eight form entry school as it is too small.</p>
<p>I disagree, especially as there are two schools right next door either side of it.</p>
<p>I do not believe this is a suitable site for a school. The Adult Education facilities would be lost and the increased traffic in the area is likely to cause problems.</p>
<p>I do not believe this is the right area. Many problems will occur, especially ones concerning the traffic in the area, which already is quite bad, but will worsen if around 3000 people try to get to the area every morning.</p>
<p>I do not know enough to have an opinion. Is there an issue of North Kingston parents not wanting their children to take a bus or not wanting to send their children to more socially mixed areas of the borough, or of Ham?</p>
<p>I do not know the area well enough to agree</p>
<p>I do not think any alternative locations have been sufficiently researched. This is a quick fix option and a "rush job". What about Dinton Fields?</p>
<p>I do not think that the use of the HC should be considered - walking to games lessons is time wasting,</p>

potentially dangerous and divisive.
I do not think the site is at all suitable. Transport is poor and congested already. There are too many schools in the area already. A further school of this size and type will cause chaos and lead to friction.
I do not think the site is ideal. It is rather cramped but has good transport links. I think it would be SUITABLE FOR A SMALLER SCHOOL
I don't live in North Kingston and rarely visit so I do not feel qualified to comment
I don't think there is a better alternative
I feel that a smaller intake could be accommodated on this site but if the intake is 240 pupils per year, then I cannot agree
I feel that due thought has NOT been given to the welfare of the children already at Tiffin Girls', or indeed, Fernhill primary.
I have attended an Adult Education course at the North Kingston site (recently completed) and I would like to be reassured that Adult Education will not suffer
I have attended classes at North Kingston since it started many years ago and it has become a very popular centre over this time. I would therefore be extremely sorry were this valuable resource for Adult Education to close.
I have concerns about the number of pupils/teachers/parents needing to access Tiffin Girls/Fern hill/the new secondary school. I think that the traffic on Richmond road is often already bad and I have concerns about the effect on transport of the increase number or pupils/staff
I have mentioned this in the previous answer.
I know that there is a need for a secondary school in North Kingston but I am not convinced that all the forms should be based there
I live in Richmond and already see the need in this borough of a new school. The 2 secondary schools in the area do not convince me.
I live in South Kingston but understand the decision here must take a broader image into account
I live in Surbiton so it will be quite far away
I North Kingston I can't think of anywhere else available that is big enough
I still think the site is much too small for the size of school needed. I will be interested to hear where the 'expanded' site is coming from. However I agree that the NKC is the best site.
I strongly disagree to the location of the school. There is already a large selective secondary school and adjoining primary school on the proposed site. By building a third school in this area it will cause a detrimental effect on the existing schools, not to mention the added congestion in an already chaotic and busy area. I have nothing against the building of another school but you should reconsider an alternative site.
I strongly disagree with building a school of any type on the North Kingston site.
I strongly disagree with the building of any secondary school on the North Kingston site.
I strongly disagree with the proposed new school being in North Kingston because there are many schools there. If another school is built there it would cause congestion in the area. Issues such as travel -- the buses seem to be full already, safety needs to be considered. Will there be enough facilities for the children? And so on.
I support the verdict of residents who did not want the Hawker Centre to be built on.
I think both lower and upper schools on the same site is too large for both the school and the local area transport
I think it's too small
I think Kingston should end selection and Tiffin Girls should go back to being our neighbourhood secondary school
I think that sandwiching it between two existing schools on such a small site is a bad idea. Fern Hill is likely to expand to 3fe, Tiffin Girls is 4fe and the new school would take the total number of pupils to 3000+. Even though the majority of the new school's pupils would be 'local' there would still be a lot of additional demand on the buses and the difficulties of having so many children arriving and leaving every day are not easily overcome.
I think that this is a highly inappropriate site - see further comments below.

I think there is not a good enough transport system for the existing schools too many children of the same age on the same road.
I think this would be a much better use of this site compared to the adult education
I understand that the proposal is to take some of the ground from the already limited facilities of Tiffin Girls School. Tiffin does not have a large site as it is. Taking away ground would severely limit sporting activities in the school at a time when we are supposed to be encouraging our children to be active.
I understand that the senior classes 16-18 years olds would be accommodated at Hawkers. The original sports facilities should NOT be diminished if this is approved.
I understand why this site is proposed, but am extremely concerned that the site may be too small to host an 8 Form Entry school.

One of the reasons given for building on this site is to do with transport. It states that many students will be expected to walk to school or cycle, as they will be living nearby. The alternative arrangements for existing users of the site are not spelt out very convincingly
The area already contains 2 schools and will not cope with another large school in this area. Even with staggered start times traffic will be seriously compromised in the area. What happens if additional primary places are needed or Tiffin Girls need to expand in the future?
The area already has lots of primary schools and a secondary school. Building another school would increase traffic chaos and lead to more pollution and put a lot of pressure on the local community. The school should be built at another location as the location that has been selected is probably not adequate enough for the scale of construction. It would also interfere with the running of nearby schools, especially schools that perform very well academically, such as the Tiffin Girls' School. Rather than using the Adult Learning Centre site, finding a new site with enough space and good facilities would serve better for the future generation and not interfere with the smooth running of the nearby schools.
The area around the site is too small. 3000 pupils plus parents will be accessing the area between the hours of 8.30 and 9 and 3-4pm. Congestion on the Richmond Road will be intolerable. I assume TFL will provide an extra fleet of buses as there are insufficient at [present for Greycourt and Tiffin's pupils. Add another 1200 in to the mix and you are looking at gridlock at best and accidents at worst
The area in question already has over 1000 students and staff which the current infrastructure can barely support. This proposal would nearly triple the numbers in and around this site.

The Kingston local history room, after underfunding threat, must be found a suitable new home in recognition of its vital contribution to local academic and personal history knowledge. Can the university assist with this as there are already close links?
The lack of sports fields and facilities is a huge concern, considering obesity is on the increase in this country. The opportunity to partake in sports lessons. What are children to do during break/lunchtimes?
The local infrastructure of transport and road/pavement structure does not support a safe movement of a combined population of students and teachers accessing and leaving this locality. I do not think and am STRONGLY DISAGREEING with any removal of facilities from an existing school to support the building/development of a new one.
The local infrastructure (roads and public transport) do not support another school in the area
The local infrastructure cannot absorb another school of this size in the area.
The local roads cannot cope with this sort of traffic. A FIRE STATION IS WITHIN 1/4 MILE ON THIS MAIN ROAD INTO KINGSTON
The need is undoubtedly here in this area
The NK site provides more than adult education. It is often the first move back into society for people with severe mental health problems and disabilities, and the elderly. It is a social service centre in the truest sense and you will disperse and fragment it so that all is lost. Why can't you look elsewhere? You say the services will be provided around the borough but have not said where. Yet again the disabled and minority groups get showed out of the way and forced back into isolation, against government guidelines.
The NKC already is a learning centre and the environment or the surroundings will not be affected.
The north Kingston centre seems to be a well used and valued facility and there do not seem to be any clear plans for what will happen to the services it provides
The north Kingston centre should be kept for adult education. If a new site has to be found please could it be near the North Kingston centre I.E. not a long way across the borough. Also a car park should be at the site
The north Kingston centre site seems to be too small to accommodate the proposed number of pupils which is a serious drawback. Wither just do 6 form or however many can be accommodated on 14000m2 or split off 6 <sup>th</sup> form. It is unacceptably to take land for Tiffin Girls school (presumed meaning of "local negotiation" expand the size of the site etc.
The North Kingston Centre site is nowhere near large enough to accommodate a school the size that the Council wishes to build. The impact on the surrounding residential area would be massive. Not only would the new school be so large that it would dwarf all surrounding houses but the noise created by over 1500 pupils in outside yards, etc would be unbearable for those living in Wolsey Drive and other streets surrounding the North Kingston site.

The north Kingston site already has 2 schools placed next to one another so this is the wrong place to build a school.
The North Kingston Site is far too small for an 8 form entry secondary school. Situated between two other schools, the additional concentration of a further large number of students would cause chaos on the narrow pavements & public transport in the vicinity. In addition, suitable alternative premises would need to be found to re-locate not only Adult Education but also the Heritage & Archives Service, Mecklenburg (the pupil referral unit), the section of Kingston College based at NKC at present, plus RAKAT - office & fleet of buses.
The north Kingston site is only suitable if it is a relatively small school, minimise local traffic impact and not needing buildings at the Hawker centre
The North Kingston site is relatively small and accommodates the adult education; surely it would be better to expand the Fernhill primary school into this site. As stated before the Hawker site seems preferable. There are many parents who take their girls to the Tiffin girls school as they come from far away and the traffic will be unbearable for all road users/residents
The North Kingston Site is too crowded as it is now, with itself and two schools as neighbours. The traffic in the area is bad enough now. A new school will just totally blocked the whole traffic at drop off and pick up times. I strongly advocate the new school to be located in a site reasonably away from North Kingston Site.
The North Kingston site is too small to accommodate such a large secondary school. There are implications in terms of congestion of the surrounding roads.

The present users will be greatly disadvantaged by losing this facility. They would not necessarily be able to travel further afield to alternative venues. Also you have not made a definite statement that the Hawker Centre will not be needed for activities other than outside sports. I am really worried that when the plans are drawn up you will suddenly announce the loss of our other community centre.
The propose site is not suitable. The proposed plans are impracticable. Adult education is given too low a priority to local people
The proposed
The proposed site is far too small with very little outdoor space for the children, resulting in an inefficient tower block of a school. It is a failing school waiting to happen.
The proposed site is not suitable for a school of this size
The proposed SIZE is too big for the proposed site
The proposed size of the new school and its location next to existing Tiffin Girls and Fern hill schools is likely to have a harmful impact on these existing schools as well as on traffic/bus travel for pupils
The proposed size of the school means that the North Kingston site is not suitable. The sheer scale of the facilities needed to accommodate the needs of so many children mean that it will have a serious impact on the surrounding area. Combined with the proposed expansion of Fern Hill Primary school this means that a proposed 3270 children and up to 300 staff will be accessing the area (the proposed new school, Tiffin Girls School and Fern Hill Primary). It is obvious that this will lead to significant pressure on the local infrastructure, particularly roads and public transport. The latter already is unable to cope with the current numbers of children using the 65 bus. The physical size of the site is not sufficient for the proposed facility and there is no doubt that adjacent schools will suffer, especially if their grounds are taken from them. The council must also impact on the students of placing the school next to the Tiffin Girls School and inevitable friction that will ensue.
The rest of the Borough is poorly served for co-educational schools. We need it in Tolworth.
The Richmond road is already grossly over-crowded to the point of becoming dangerous especially when Richmond park is closed, and the bus service can barely cope with the current numbers of schoolchildren.
The Richmond road is already heavily congested - I feel the impact on the neighbourhood would be distressing for local residents

The Richmond Road will be MANIC at 3.40pm every day. The 65 bus will not cope with all the pupils, let alone non-school people on the bus
The road (Richmond Road) has been the site of at least 2 fatal accidents during school congestion time. Despite efforts to slow traffic, the risk is already huge. This will make the likelihood inevitability. This area is also horrifically congested at the best of times. It will become impossible, particularly in the mornings. No recognition at all has been given to the needs of Fern Hill and Tiffin Girls pupils
The road outside the North Kingston site is Inadequate at the moment, how would it cope with the inevitable increase in traffic?
The school benefits from being all on one site. If the 6th form is built elsewhere, e.g. HC then it should be a separate institution run as a 6th form college.
The School could be built on the Hawker site complete with all the sporting facilities. The North Kingston Centre site could retain present use
the school should be built on an area that is much less busy, otherwise the area will be too cramped
The school should not be built on the North Kingston site until an alternative location for the Adult Education Site has been found.
The sheer numbers of children on the Richmond Rd with huge traffic problems from cars and an inadequate bus service. This road is blocked on a regular basis even at present. A school this size is intimidating for primary children at Fern Hill and putting a large mixed secondary next to selective girls is asking for rivalries and social problems.
THE SITE DOES NOT APPEAR TO BE BIG ENOUGH FOR A SCHOOL OF THAT SIZE
The site is far from ideal but I cannot think of an alternative
The site is far too small. There are already 2 schools on the site which need all the existing land. A new large school would not fit on the proposed site let alone extra facilities like playground/car park
The site is fit for purpose and already has a school building there which can be modernised and extended at LESS COST
The site is much too small for the proposed eight forms of entry. No consideration has been taken of the adjacent schools which have four forms of entry and a proposed three forms of entry. The proposal will lead to travel chaos and extreme overcrowding.
The site is not big enough. It will destroy the amenities currently there which are already well used. It is too close to Richmond
The site is not big enough. Land should not be removed from either of the schools, either side. Parking of staff and parents will be a huge issue. Bus services will not be able to cope with increased numbers.
The site is not big enough. It will be overcrowded with schools all next to each other. Getting the bus will be a nightmare for the schoolchildren, it's bad enough anyway at TGS.
The site is not convenient for travelling into school Richmond Road is very busy and there are human traffic jams on the pavements with the children going to Fern Hill. It is hard to imagine what it will be like if you add another couple thousand people travelling this way every morning. I also think that the road is too dangerous for cycling.
The site is not nearly big enough. There will be far too many people located on one site with Tiffin Girls' School and Fern Hill Primary School. Traffic will be horrendous - the North Kingston Centre is already a nightmare during drop off times for Fern Hill with dangerous parking. To increase the number of pupils by approx 1600 is ridiculous and to say traffic might reduce is just nonsense. Public transport on 65 buses is already bad with the Tiffin Girls, another secondary school of the size proposed would make it unworkable. To use Hawker Centre for all sporting activities would restrict use for current users.
The site is there with grounds available to extend the existing building footprint. Bus services available, on the Richmond Road
The site is too near two schools already meaning that drop off would become impossible. Also one of the other schools is a secondary school, putting another secondary school right next door will cause friction. Also there is not enough land for the NKS to support 240 pupils per year group. Tiffin Girls school should not be compromised as it is an outstanding grammar school with good facilities which is necessary for the girls to acquire an all rounded education. In today's society where the emphasis is on leading health lifestyles it is very important that the girls maintain a structured P.E programme throughout their school years. We are constantly reminded that obesity is on the increase and our government are now paying excessive amount of money per year because of major illnesses through

obesity. Therefore let us not make mistakes, and when planning a new school it is important that we provide sports facilities however we must not compromise the girls at Tiffin's by taking their land. I would also like to point out that if the council are looking to acquire the Hawker centre for the sports facilities then this is obviously not the right site. You have an opportunity to get this right please DONT compromise any children it is important they have their own facilities on site. They already have limited land and taking some away would be a massive mistake.
The site is too small and a large school would lead to congestion in the area.
The site is too small and facilities will be cramped and overstretched.
The site is too small for such a large school, which would result in 15 forms of entry with the neighbouring schools in a relatively small combined area with poor transport infrastructure on a very busy road in a highly residential area. Other options should be looked at e.g. a new school in Richmond or another site in Kingston or a small school (4FE instead of 8FE).
The site is too small for such a large school. The extra traffic which would be sure to occur could be problematical, given that there is already a large school on the neighbouring site (Tiffin Girls) and a primary school
The site is too small to sustain this size of school. Using the Tiffin Girls site or part of the Tiffin Girls site would be a better solution. Tiffin Girls school does NOT serve the local community
The site is too small, the impact on existing schools is unacceptable, as a local resident, the concentration of students/resultant traffic on the Richmond road will be horrendous.
The site is too small.
The site is too small. It will be crowded with Tiffin Girls and Fern hill next door. The site needs to be bigger for the new school and they need more space. so the NKC is a bad idea.
The site is way too small. It means you have to take land from Tiffin Girls; this is unfair because they saved up for the AstroTurf. Also the site is in a relatively quiet area, by building a huge school you make congestion which there already is enough of, during pick up and drop off hours it would be gridlock.
The site, as currently constituted does not offer enough space per pupil. It is adjacent to Tiffin Girls that has a much lower pupil per m2 density. It is grossly unfair to shoehorn kids onto a cramped site, whilst their selective neighbours luxuriate within their extensive grounds. All the more so when the majority of Tiffin pupils now come from outside the borough. Why should Kingston kids be crammed in, while extra-borough pupils get much more space. If Tiffin really must remain selective, then both sites should be combined into one land parcel, with the land divided between both schools on the basis of pupil numbers.
The size of school proposed is overdevelopment for such a small site. The volume of additional potential traffic on the "school run", am and pm, plus users of the already overcrowded 65 bus service will add to an already heavily used local road network in the vicinity of the site.
The size of school proposed is too large for this site
The size of the Proposed new school is out of keeping with the amount of land on the North Kingston Site and will significantly impact on the Local residence and transport systems.
The space is there it is a good location
The Tiffin Girls' School should be moved because it does not serve the local students and that building (the old Tudor School) should be returned to the community.
The Tiffin Girls site and buildings should be used, with the North Kingston site considered only if further expansion is needed.
The traffic on the Richmond Road is already horrendous. I do not believe that the borough would have any impact on preventing that traffic increasing if a new school were built here
The transport links with this area of Kingston should be improved with perhaps safe cycling routes. From New Malden, this would not be an easy site to access.
The volume of children - Tiffin Girls school, Fern hill and 8 form entry new schools is too great a mass for the location - circa 3500 children and staff. LOGISTICS: it is already difficult for children to access TGS easily as the bus service is very poor (65 in particular) The proposals to take land from Tiffin Girls school is totally unacceptable. You are penalising one very effective school which offers a very broad curriculum (including sport) to give to another. What if TGS wanted to expand? There would be no space.
then there will be 3 schools next door to each other (2 secondary and 1 primary), it's too much and not practical; the school should be built somewhere else

Then where will all of the adults who work and learn at the north Kingston site go?????????
There appears to be insufficient space for such a large school - it will be cramped and allow insufficient open areas for pupils to be outside in break times. The Hawker facilities for recreation area distinctly second best option.
There are a lot of schools nearby and it will become too busy and children might decide to go to the new proposed one instead.
There are already 1500 pupils in Tiffin girls and the primary school Fern Hill. Adding another 1900 people to the site is excessive
There are already 2 schools adjacent to each other. This presents traffic problems at certain times of the day and also on special events where parents park locally. Also no one has mentioned where the Adult Education Facilities will move to if the school goes ahead
There are already 2 schools almost next door to each other with the attendant parking chaos. While it might be preferable for pupils to go to the new school on foot or on public transport, in practice, parents often drop them off on the way to work because it is convenient. The site is not big enough for the proposed school - having to have sports facilities elsewhere and a 6th form "up in the air", maybe there, maybe at the HC. The NK site already fulfils a role of importance as an adult education centre and is much more suited to this purpose.
There are already 2 schools nearby - Tiffin Girls and Fern hill. There is no room for the extra children and vehicles involved. Many will come by car, no matter how you try and stop that. Be realistic.
There are already 2 schools surrounding the proposed site, with Fern hill about to expand. If the new school infringes on these school sites in any way then this is unacceptable. The Tiffin Girl's school does not have enough recreational area as it is. The new school will put a strain on the already over burdened infrastructure.
There are already a lot of schools in that area and I wonder whether a site at the other end of the borough might be better.
There are already enough schools there, this will crowd
There are already far too many schools and the bus stops are so overcrowded as it is in the mornings and afternoons. Too add another school in between the already large number of students at Tiffin and Fern Hill would be complete madness for students and residents and would pose several safety risks as from what I understand there is only one bus along that route, the 65 which we all know is incredibly unpredictable and overcrowded as it is - often 5 or 6 going past before all the Tiffin and Fern Hill students get on after school, will have to accommodate an additional number of students - a ridiculous amount of new students. Awful, dangerous for residents and students. No, no, no.
There are already two schools adjacent to this site. The traffic in this area is already at a standstill and it can take 30 minutes to get to Kingston. The proposed school is massive and will make travel impossible. This site is too small.
There are already two schools and it will take away some of Tiffin Girls' School site. It will also cause a lot of traffic.
There are already two schools in close vicinity to each other Tiffin Girls and Grey Court which already taxes public transportation. Additionally the private roads in this area are heavily populated with traffic.
there are already two schools next to each other, it would be too cramped
There are already two schools on either side of that site. It is such a small place to try and build an eight form entry school.
There are already two schools on this site and the resulting traffic chaos if another school is added would be too much for what is the major road for Kingston to Richmond. I am also concerned about the possibility of fight between Tiffin Girls and non selective schools.
There are already two schools on this site in addition to three senior schools nearby ( Tiffin boys, Kingston grammar and grey court)
There are schools there already. Another school will just put pressure on the infrastructure.
There do not appear to be many alternatives and this will also provide a buffer from the neighbouring borough.
there is a need
There is a real need for a secondary school within the north side of the borough. There are several choices in the Kingston town/Surbiton area

<p>There is an existing primary school AND secondary school right next to the proposed site. The new school will nearly triple the number of pupils visiting the area and the extra strain on services, especially the already strained public transport facilities on Richmond Road, is totally unacceptable. In addition, a girl was killed on Richmond Road outside Tiffin Girls' School a few years ago. Is tripling the number of pupils in the area really going to make this safer?</p>
<p>There is certainly no room for a school of this capacity in North Kingston and most definitely not in an area which is quite crowded already with two other schools. In my view, this would make the area extremely hazardous during drop off and collection times.</p>
<p>There is enough schools and traffic around this area without any more people and Children adding to it.</p>
<p>There is growing demand for a school in this area based on where pupils live. Having a school in North Kingston should enable many to walk and cycle to school which is good for health and the environment.</p>
<p>There is insufficient space. I understand that it is proposed that that the land associated with Tiffin Girls' All Weather Hockey Pitch but used for many sports should be transferred to the new school. The loss would be more than Tiffin Girls'. I understand that many outside sports clubs use this surface after school and that if this floodlit pitch ceased to exist it would represent a serious reduction in local sports facilities and arguably would be worse than building over yet another playing field.</p>

<p>There is no evidence to suggest that the population growth is evident, particularly in the NK area as there are no houses built in this area. The Richmond Road is frequently congested and cannot cope with any more increase in volume of traffic. Build the new secondary school somewhere else, but not in NK.</p>
<p>There is no good reason for this school to be put on this small and already crowd site. The Richmond Road is a very busy road and then to add further traffic to it mix with several hundreds of children seems utter madness. It is beyond me why Kingston and Richmond cannot work in partnership to develop Grey court which under the headship of Maggie Bailey is thriving. Greycourt is on wonderful site with enough land to build alongside the existing building causing minimal disruption to already attending students, it also boast fantastic playing fields which could be developed into great sport facilities which could also serve the local community. Unlike the north Kingston centre where building would cause huge disruption and inconvenience to the children of fern hill and Tiffin's. There also appears to be no actual playing space in this proposed site, I'm not sure how the council is going to manage 100's of teenagers crossing a very busy road safely just so they can get some exercise at lunch time.</p>
<p>There is not enough room here for a large school and more to the point the green site by the river Thames HC will need to be used which is totally unacceptable. Do not erode our free spaces - community areas are very important and need to be left for our young people so that they can go somewhere at weekends, after school and in the holiday</p>
<p>There is not enough space. Too much congestion.</p>
<p>There is nothing in this area for children who live in North Kingston. The criteria for admission should have nearest location to school close to the top</p>
<p>There is significant pressure on other RBK schools. This proposal appears to be aimed at alleviating the pressure on Richmond borough schools as opposed to the focus being on Kingston schools</p>
<p>There MUST be a more suitable site. The huge traffic concentration before and after schools would be huge and quite dangerous. Also, Tiffin old building should be preserved.</p>
<p>There should be a joint venture with Richmond to use the Greycourt school site. North Kingston is too small and the density of schools in the area would be too high</p>
<p>There should not be in any case 2 secondary school next door to each other</p>
<p>There will be 3 schools close to each other which will result in NIGHTMARE traffic and very dangerous for children attending the schools. Accidents that happen because of this will be the responsibility of Kingston council</p>
<p>There will be 3270 pupils' c300 staff accessing a very small area. The public transport links will not be able to support this new school. The school times will have to be varied causing traffic over a prolonged period.</p>
<p>There will be far too many children on the site alongside Tiffin Girls and Fern Hill. Dangerous for the children and far too much pressure on the local amenities</p>

There will be far too many pupils located on the whole site - Tiffin Girls (6 form entry), New School (8form entry) and Fern Hill (2 form entry) plus nursery. Where the schools are located is a busy stretch of main road and there had already been one pupil death.
There will be FOUR schools within a very narrow geographical area (Tiffin girls, Fern hill, Greycourt and the new school) The implications of this for congestion, road safety etc. are extremely serious
There will be no perfect place to build a school. I hope provision will be made for adult education as I have used the North Kingston Centre and it is a valuable resource for the community.
There will be too many schools too near to each other
There will be traffic hazard and chaos along the Richmond Road if there are to be this many additional students on this site. Roads and buses are already overloaded with the combined nos. for Greycourt, Christ's, Tiffin Girls (Tiffin Boys, Kingston Grammar)
There will be trouble with having another school in such close proximity. This would happen anywhere in the world not just Kingston.
There would then be three schools right next door to each other. There would be huge implications for traffic on the road and pupil numbers leaving and arriving on the sites.
These aspects plus these put forwards in the proposal.
These sites are not suitable for such a large school and do not provide enough room for playing fields. In addition, to lose the adult education centre and Hawker Centre is creating another problem for the local community.
they should put it where they built all the flats that have over populated Kingston schools and services
Think that option of sixth form on Hawker site would be better than trying to make North Kingston site cope with such a large school.
This area cannot take a further school. The roads and transport system are already strained to breaking point.
This area is nowhere near big enough for a school of this size with regards to pupils/staff/visitors/traffic as well as the impact on local residents and the members of the local primary school.
This centre for adults is excellent, I use it every year. Where will it go?
This could lead to a combined total of c. 3,270 pupils and c. 300 staff accessing the 3 school sites each day. The effect of this on the transport infrastructure in the area would be catastrophic. The North Kingston Centre site is also very small in size for the proposed school roll number.
This is a quiet residential area - the transport and infrastructure cannot cope. The site is also much too small. It seems like a thinly disguised attempt to take over the Tiffin Girls School or drive it away.
This is a ridiculous suggestion. The site is too small. This would mean TAKING land from Tiffin Girls school and therefore impacting on current provision negatively. In addition the transport infrastructure is already failing to accommodate links to stations. As so many children will be trying to access the same buses this would be an accident waiting to happen.
This is a very restricted site which causes concern. What is to happen to adult education courses currently run there? A cast iron guarantee is needed for them.
This is a very valued site by the local community for adult learning. The building is lovely and has recently been renovated. An 8 form entry school would be a monstrosity
This is adjoining a selective girl's school and there might be rivalry and problems. If they shared facilities that might be an advantage and would go some way to making N Kingston children able to benefit from Tiffin ins which otherwise excludes many local children whilst accepting children from far and wide which causes a lot of discontent locally.
This is an area which is in need of a new school and to free up other schools in the borough
This is an unacceptable site for 1,600 pupils. 5 storeys is a disaster, and lack of playground is terrible. Although this site could be OK for a school half the size. Please look for another site.
This is clearly the best site of all those proposed in the North Kingston area. In addition, the school should be located in NORTH Kingston, and not surrounding areas, which are already well served for secondary schools.
This is far too close to two other schools and will place too much strain on access and facilities
This is the area without its own non selective secondary school
This is the worst site out of the other proposed sites. NK site is totally unsuitable. It will create many difficulties

This is where the need is!
This is wrong site for new school. The original proposal of Greycourt should have gone ahead. The space is there and the cost would be much less. The school would still be near to the North Kingston and all the Negative issues of this proposal would be answered
This may not be bad location but more consideration should be given to alternative locations.
This only goes part of the way to solving the problem. A new school is also needed in Surbiton by the time the new school opens should change the rules of Tiffin schools and build new school in Surbiton
This proposal would negatively impact students attending Tiffin Girls school and also disrupt adult education (already scarce) in the borough. Land must not be taken from Tiffin Girls and construction will blight the school experience for those currently attending.
this proposed school would place already strained and limited public transport links in complete overload
This seems a sensible site to build a small to medium sized school. However I do not think it is a suitable site for an 8 form entry school with sixth form.
This site already has two schools in close proximity. The transport infrastructure will not support a third school located in the same area.
This site has always been for education purposes and it would seem right that it should be used for a new school
This site homes the Adult education centre which is of prime importance in this borough. where it is situated it appropriate for the students who attend from young people on the bus and older people who are able to park
This site is extremely useful, and it would be horrifying to see it taken away.
This site is far too small for an 8 form entry secondary school. Where will the children play? organised i.e./sport is one thing, but young people need to get outside in between lessons
This site is far too small for an 8 form entry site with a sixth form eventually - that is 1680 extra pupils. There does not appear to be enough land to do this and permanently expand Fern Hill to a 3 form entry school. Will Tiffin Girls be giving up any of their land for this? There appears to be a huge amount of land in front of Tiffin Girls that never seems to be used - could not this be used by them and the Astroturf pitch to the side be used by the Secondary school?
This site is just too small for your proposals. Maybe Kingston council should have thought of schools before allowing all the extra housing to be built in Kingston.
This site is not appropriate for a school. Who ever heard of three school sites being adjacent to one another, on with an 8 form entry? You will have eventually 3,270 pupils and over 300 staff all accessing this small site and 670 pupils in the expanded Fern Hill. In short this proposal is farcical, the space limitations and the inevitable transport chaos (even with staggered starts and ends to the school day).
This site is not big enough and would mean a very large group of children in one area would cause traffic problems
This site is too cramped for a large school. 5 storeys and the lack of playground space is unacceptable.
This site is too small for the number of students. Already there are two schools 'next door' to each other and the parking and traffic is very poor to say the least. Students, staff and parents are all at a great risk of accidents. Both schools try to implement safe travel and parking etc but this would become extremely difficult and very dangerous with the increased number of people arriving and being in the area at any one time.
This site is too small to accommodate an 8 entry school. It is located on a busy road (A307) between a large primary and secondary school. There will be little if any space for recreational use.
This site is totally inappropriate for the location and development of such a large school.
This site is totally unsuitable for a large secondary school. The proposal to place a new school between and existing secondary school (Tiffin Girls) and a primary school is not practical. Traffic on Richmond Road would create chaos. It is also inappropriate to move the Adult education centre- it is an excellent facility providing valuable sources
This site is well used by Adult education and is far too small for the proposal. The traffic in this area has changed dramatically in the last few years (I have used the road daily for 19 years) and queues in the morning and evening are caused now by a combination of the high number of parents driving to Fern Hill from local roads and the traffic visiting Sainsbury. Tiffin Girls adds to this but is of long standing so I have not been able to see a difference in the traffic. Each car waiting to cross oncoming

traffic to turn into the school dramatically slows cars.
This site was once successfully occupied by Tiffin Girls school and Tudor (and Rivermead) Schools. the addition of Fern hill will add to pressure on the infrastructure but this could be a problem on any site
This site, along with Fern hill Primary School and TGS, provides education to the people of the area at all levels, as well as other services, which a conversion to another secondary school would not provide. This site also entails many concerns, for example, with consideration to the number of pupils and parents present in the area before and after school, and also with the social effect on the surrounding schools. There would be significantly fewer concerns with this proposal if the site of the school was at least 2 miles from the site of TGS.
This will impact negatively on the schools already thereby an influx of traffic and the possibility of a loss of control of Tiffin Girls school on their environment.
This would cause CHAOS at the beginning and end of the day
This would mean terrible circumstances for the girls of Tiffin Girls' as they could possibly be losing their whole Astroturf pitch (which many schools and clubs benefit from) and some of their netball and tennis courts. It could also lead to (as mentioned above) bullying.
Thought needs to be given to the access to the school for pupil safety and given the HIGH VOLUME of students attending the new school, Fern hill Primary and Tiffin Girls school on the busy Richmond Road
Tiffin Girls Astroturf site at the side nearest the NKC should remain intact and continue to be used by Tiffin and the other schools and clubs which value its facilities. It serves a widely used sporting and community function.
Tiffin Girls School should be combined with the new school.
Tiffin's girls need their land! Their Astroturf pitch is used by other people in the community... DO NOT TAKE TIFFINS GIRL'S LAND!!
To be honest I am just glad it has finally started to happen - more schools and places are becoming available
Too many schools in the North Kingston area. We already have Tiffin Girls and various primary schools. Find a better location.
To not support the existing and now more than reasonable local school (Greycourt) would be a WASTE OF RESOURCES and a dilution of EFFORT AND TALENT. Competition between the schools would give neither ENOUGH MONEY and what about the TRAFFIC situation?
Too close to existing schools - too much school traffic
Too close to Fern hill and Tiffin Girls. Catchment area would be skewed towards Richmond as is Greycourt towards Kingston. Therefore will not solve the problem of children living in the area having places. The site is not large enough for the number of pupils expected.

We live in Surbiton and there seem to be a huge shortage of school places in our area as well. I would welcome a school closer to the KT5 area
We live very near so could cause some disruption to us regarding parking
We need one in the area
What about Adult Education? Where will that go?
What about children in the S Surbiton area - will they be eligible for the school?
What about residents in South Central Kingston?
What about south of the borough? if primary need to expand where are these kids going to go around here in years to come
What about using the Tiffin Girls site and moving that school to nearer the A3 given its high intake from Surrey. The school has limited local links.
What's wrong with West, East and South Kingston? If people are that desperate it's only a little more on a bus or train or car to get there.
Where else is there? It is a pity the Council was so short sighted and missed an opportunity to acquire land across the road from the North Kingston site, which has now been developed as yet more housing, and would have been perfect to accommodate some of the new School.
Where there is the most need, yes.
While I agree that NK is the area in need of a new school, I am concerned that using the NKC site will adversely affect the two excellent provisions already sited nearby - Fern hill and Tiffin Girls. See also comments below regarding the proposed "land grab"
Whilst I agree with the redevelopment of the NK site, I am strongly opposed to any part of the HC being used for building w which I note you have not ruled out in the final paragraph on page 11. I am not a member or user of the HC. This is an open space for ALL THE COMMUNITY to enjoy
Whilst I might have general concerns about the traffic implications on this already busy part of town (and though it doesn't particularly affect me), we would appear to have little option but to opt this site. What is the purpose of soliciting the public's view?
Why have another school near the Richmond end of Kingston, very suburban less densely populated. Surely the bulk of the population is over the other side of Fairfield and would mean less travelling time and less town centre traffic.
Why North Kingston and not in Chessington

With over 4500 children in one area at school times there will be chaos on the road outside which is unfair for people travelling to Kingston and will make their journey to work much longer!
With regard to AE in the borough there are plenty of Church, Village Halls of course, they must be easily accessible.
With the new proposed school having approx 1700 pupils, with the existing schools and the proposed expansion of Fern Hill a combined total of c. 3,270 pupils and c. 300 staff would be accessing the 3 sites each day. This will have a disastrous effect on the already overstretched transport infrastructure in the area. We are also concerned about The proposed North Kingston Centre site is very small in size. As you are proposing to expand the size of the site available to the new school I am concerned that any expansion of this site could lead to the loss of open space and sporting provision at The Tiffin Girls' School.
Would be better in Kingston Town Centre if a site existed, as this is central to the transport network for all pupils in the Borough.
Would be much better to base it at Hawker Centre site which has much more space - and to incorporate the HC community centre into the North Kingston Centre - perfect to bring adult education and community activities together close to Fern hill Primary
Would be too crowded with two other existing schools on both sides.
Would have preferred it to be more central -e.g. Norbiton as Grey court and Teddington are near the proposed site or in Worcester Park as non Catholics experience difficulties...
Would like something closer as well
Wrong site
We do not want a secondary school in North Kingston. Tiffin Girls should be non selective. The North Kingston Centre and Hawker Centre play a vital role in our community and should not be changed re that purpose. We do not want another school in this area when we have a perfectly good one, Tiffin, so that could solve part of the problem
Yet again the residents of Worcester Park in the Kingston borough will not be anywhere near this school. We already can't get into the nearest Kingston schools.
You do not give proper details of alternatives so no rational choice can be made. Clearly you want and expect to get this single choice. Hardly democratic!
You have built houses/flats and supermarkets on all the sites you could have used
you haven't explored other sites properly Too near Richmond boundary
You shouldn't put a school in an area that already has two right next to each other
You'd be better off putting it on Dinton Field
Your statistics showed us that some children in the north of the borough go to schools in Richmond. You didn't bother to show us the numbers of students who go to other boroughs besides Richmond and surely these must also exist. The lack of numbers for other boroughs makes your argument appear one-sided and reduces its credibility. I would like to know why other parts of the borough have not also been considered - especially as future growth may be stronger near the Green Belt if, one day, we are forced to build on that land to meet the housing needs of a growing population.
