Things to consider

1. Which courses?

Choose a course that:

- reflects your interests and personal qualities.
- enables you to learn in ways that best suit you.
- you know you can do well in.
- will help you to move on whilst keeping your options open for the future.
- has entry requirements that you can achieve.

Choose carefully, be realistic and remember that your choices will affect your future.

2. Where should I continue my learning?

- Think first about what you want to study.
- Find out where you can follow these courses.
- Visit these schools/colleges/training providers and find out as much as you can by talking to staff and learners. See *dates of open events on below*.
- Think about the length of the journey – can you get there easily?

3. Thinking Ahead

As well as considering what courses you should take at 14 and 16 you need to consider long term plans.

Employment

- If you know what type of job you would like, find a course that would help you on your way.
- If you have not decided yet, choose a course that will keep your options open.

Higher Education

- To go to university you will need to meet their level 3 requirements. Remember that some universities seek passes in specific GCSE subjects as well as level 3 requirements.
- If you have a clear idea about a particular higher education course that you would like to do at 18 or 19, find out what the specific entry requirements are. Start with the UCAS website www.ucas.com.

Not sure

- If you have no clear ideas about the future – don't worry. Connexions/Prospects personal advisers, your careers teacher, your form tutor and your parents/carers are all here to help you make your decision.

4. Are there any costs?

On some courses you may need to buy specialist equipment, stationery etc and pay for field trips. This is something to consider when choosing a course. Help however is available through EMAs (Education Maintenance Allowances) for conscientious and hardworking students who have good attendance and punctuality.

- EMA is a weekly payment of £10, £20 or £30 a week depending on your household income of up to £30,810 per year.
- The money is intended to help with day-to-day costs when you stay at school, college or a training provider – such as travel, books and equipment for your learning programme.
- Most eligible young people will be able to get an EMA for 2 or 3 years depending on how long they take to finish their learning.
- From April 2006, EMA has been extended to those young people on an E2E course or taking a learning programme that leads to an apprenticeship.

Kingston Open Events

An important part of the process of choosing where you will study is to attend the open events which are arranged for you.

There are three purposes to attending these events, which are explained below.

- Firstly you need to decide where you wish to spend years 12 & 13. It is very important that you are happy with your choice – you are more likely to be successful in an environment that suits you.
- Secondly, even if you know where you wish to study, you need guidance from teachers on what studying different subjects will be like. This is a real opportunity for you to ensure that you pick courses that will be enjoyable and lead you in the right direction for your future.
- Thirdly, it is a chance for you to ask questions so that you can prepare yourself for the challenges of studying at the next level. You should prepare some questions before you attend the evening so that you know what information you want to get.

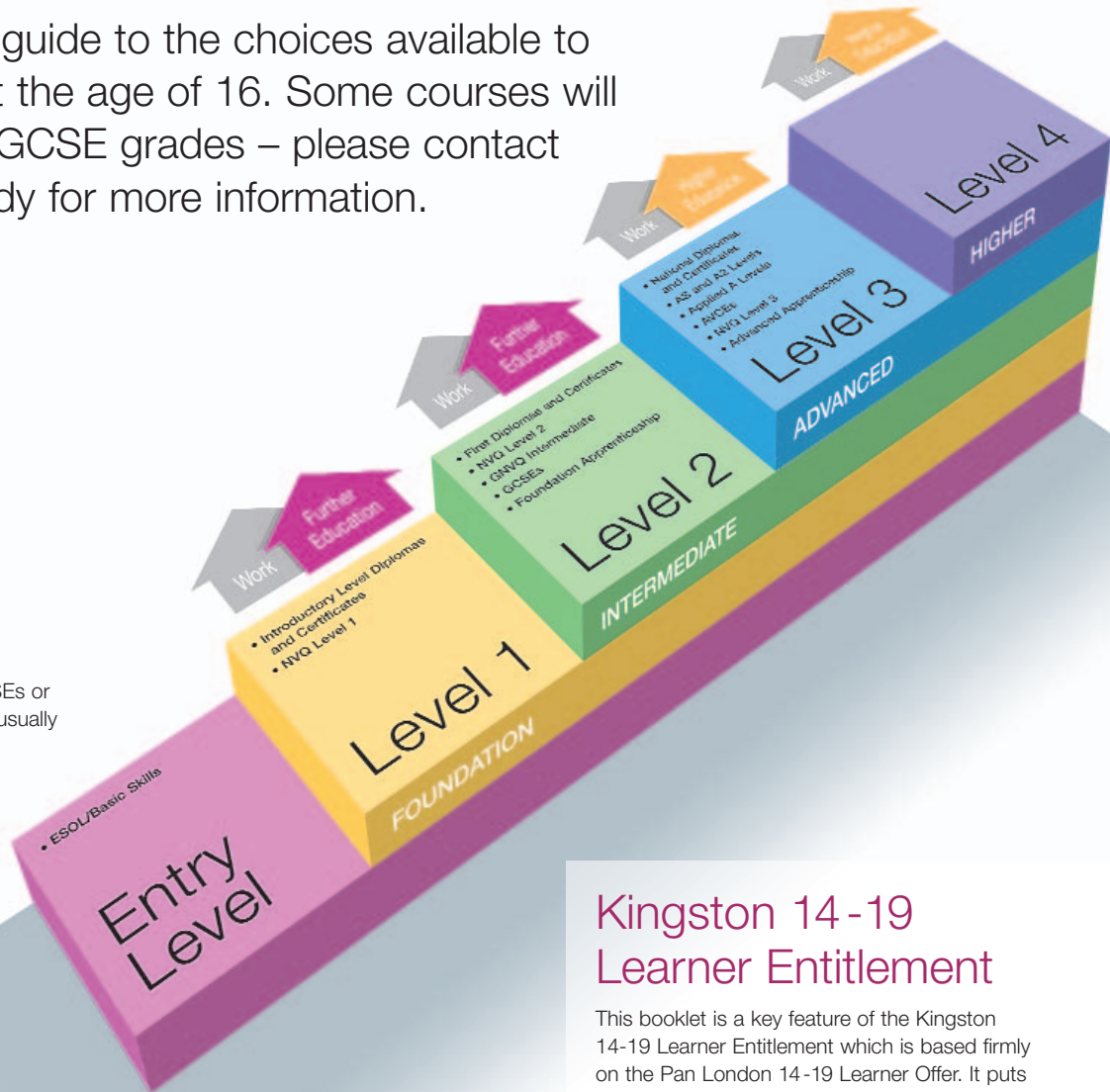

What choices do you have?

This is a simple guide to the choices available to young people at the age of 16. Some courses will require specific GCSE grades – please contact the place of study for more information.



Entry Level

This is your first step if you have no GCSEs or formal qualifications. Places on courses usually depend on a satisfactory interview and reference.

These courses provide lots of support and help you to develop your personal and work skills.

Success on an entry level course will move you up to a Level 1 qualification in your chosen area.

Level 1 - FOUNDATION

To be on this step you will have achieved GCSEs at grades E-G or successfully completed your Entry Level course. You will be able to choose from Introductory Diplomas and Vocational Courses, many of which include practical experience either at your place of study or through work experience. From here you can step up to a Level 2 qualification or enter the workplace in your chosen area.

Level 2 - INTERMEDIATE

If you have mainly D grades at GCSE or have successfully completed your Foundation course, then this step is yours. You can choose a Foundation Apprenticeship, First Diploma, Intermediate course, a National Certificate or retake GCSEs. Your next step will be to Advanced Level courses or to increased employment opportunities if you decide to go to work.

Level 3 - ADVANCED

To be on this step you will usually need a minimum of 4 or 5 GCSEs at A* - C or Merit grades on your Level 2 course. An advanced level qualification is usually equivalent to A Levels and will allow progression to higher education or employment at technician or supervisory level.

Level 4 - HIGHER

You will have successfully completed your Level 3 course and can choose to study a Higher National Certificate or Diploma course, a Foundation Degree or Degree. (You may also need to have GCSE Grade C (minimum) in Maths and English.)

Kingston 14-19 Learner Entitlement

This booklet is a key feature of the Kingston 14-19 Learner Entitlement which is based firmly on the Pan London 14-19 Learner Offer. It puts the learner at the heart of all we do. All young people in Kingston regardless of where they live, where they learn or which learning pathway they follow, should be able to benefit from a choice of high quality, appropriate and diverse provision.

The aim is that through the Kingston 14-19 Learner Entitlement every young person will have access to the following provision.

- A choice of high quality, coherent, engaging and rich programmes of learning.
- Integrated and coherent information, advice and guidance both ongoing and at key decision-making points that support young people to access opportunities and to progress, with additional support available to vulnerable and at risk young people.
- High quality teaching, training, assessment and feedback.
- Support to achieve their personal and learning goals.
- Access to wider experiences that draw on London's wealth of cultural, sporting, historical, technological, scientific, business and enterprise resources.

Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships offer structured training in the workplace and are available at Level 2 (Apprenticeship) and Level 3 (Advanced Apprenticeship). You will be assessed by your employer and learning provider by preparing a portfolio of evidence of the work you do and the skills you have. All apprenticeships include key skills, such as communication, numeracy and IT. If your Apprenticeship includes a technical certificate, there may also be some exams which are mainly multiple choice.

Most Apprenticeships are 'employer-led', which means you have to find a job with an employer prepared to support your training needs. There are some local and national training providers who will match potential apprentices to vacancies. For details of these, in particular for vacancies in administration, building services, child care, customer care, hospitality, motor technician and travel as well as more specialised apprenticeships such as chartered surveying and racing stable hands contact Connexions in Kingston.

Entry to Employment – E2E

If you are not ready to do an apprenticeship, further study or work think about E2E.

- Your E2E programme is adapted to suit your learning needs.
- You will have the opportunity to experience various work placements and develop the skills you need.
- Whilst on E2E your travel expenses will be paid and you may be entitled to an Educational Maintenance Allowance.
- You will spend up to 20 weeks on the E2E programme.

What you learn in your apprenticeship or advanced apprenticeship will vary. Besides gaining practical experience, skills and knowledge in your chosen employment you will also gain :

- a National Vocational Qualification (NVQ), at Level 2 for an Apprenticeship or Level 3 for an Advanced Apprenticeship;
- key skills e.g. working in teams, problem solving, communications and using new technology;
- a technical certificate such as BTEC National Diploma or a City & Guilds Progression Award (included in most Apprenticeships);
- any additional qualifications or requirements that are important for your chosen occupation .

GCSEs, AS/A2 and Applied A level Qualifications

GCSE

These are usually offered in English, Mathematics and Science as resits, alongside a full-time programme. Chessington Community College also offers Geography and History whilst Kingston College offers a wide range of GCSEs. At some institutions it is possible to take four or five subjects in one year including subjects you may not have studied before. You would normally require GCSEs at D for entry on to this programme.

AS/A2 Levels and Applied A Levels

In year 12 you may study for AS Levels or Applied AS Levels or a mixture of the two types of qualification. The Single Award Applied AS (3 units) is equivalent to 1 AS Level and the Double Award AS (6 units) is equivalent to 2 AS Levels. In year 13 you will continue with your studies, usually reducing the number of subjects that you study, and gain A2 or Applied A2 Level qualifications which, when added to the AS qualifications, make complete A Levels or Applied A Levels. These courses lead to both Higher Education and to employment.

Vocational Qualifications

1 2 3 CACHE

These are specialist courses for those who are interested in Childcare and Education. They are available at Levels 2 and 3.

1 BTEC Introductory Diplomas

The BTEC Level 1 qualifications offer you an introduction to vocational learning and provide the opportunity to progress to either Level 2 or employment.

2 BTEC First Certificates and Diplomas

These are Level 2 vocational qualifications and provide the initial knowledge and understanding for you if you are wishing to work or to take further study at Level 3.

3 BTEC National Diplomas

The BTEC National Diploma is a specialist vocational qualification valued by the industry/ sector and higher education alike. It focuses on the applied knowledge and understanding of the specific sectors. The BTEC National Diploma consists of 18 units of study and is equivalent to three A Levels. The BTEC National Diploma prepares you for direct entry into employment or for progression to Higher Education.

14-16 Vocational Courses

This information about the range of vocational courses available at Key Stage 4, Years 10 and 11, has been provided for reference purposes only this year. Young people will not be able to access courses which are not available in their own school in 2007.

However it is anticipated that in future years this will become possible as the Specialised Diplomas come on board. These will be qualifications that provide an exciting, stretching and relevant programme of learning for young people of all backgrounds and abilities. They will be available in 14 lines of learning at levels 1,2 and 3 and cover all sectors of the economy.

Kingston College offers an increased flexibility programme for 14-16 year olds. Applications can only be made at the recommendation of a young person's school and with the agreement of their parent/guardian. The College also interviews all applicants to assess their suitability to join a particular programme.

For those young people who are referred by their school to the Gaining Assets Programme (GAP) at Business Training Enterprise, there is the opportunity to gain ASDAN and Key Skill accreditation as well as AQA qualifications through activities with the Youth Service.

The organisations in this booklet aim to create a welcoming and supportive environment for all their students and clients.

For young people with a learning difficulty or disability:

- Connexions will provide advice and support on education, training or work up to their 25th birthday;
- Bedelsford, Dysart, St Philips schools and Kingston College provide special (discrete) courses which have smaller class sizes (examples are shown below);
- Organisations provide additional help with learning e.g. support staff for those who have not achieved independence or who are socially vulnerable; special access technology; extra support with planning during exam and assessment periods.
