Why Athelstan, why Kingston and why now?

Athelstan, first ruler of what we now recognise as England, has long been admired as one of our most effective monarchs. Indeed, in 2021, Athelstan was the unexpected winner of the 'World Cup of Kings and Queens' run by the hugely popular 'Rest is History Podcast'. To what does he owe this reputation? A highly educated and devout King, he gave many books and holy relics to churches and ordered that the Bible be translated into Anglo-Saxon. He was also an innovative and reforming monarch, passing many new laws and striving to ensure that these were enforced with a fairness that set him apart. Athelstan also had an international vision, forging stronger strategic links with the royal courts of Europe than any previous West Saxon King. Perhaps most notable of all was Athelstan's role in taking forward the work of his grandfather, King Alfred, in uniting the lands that now form England... and that is where Kingston enters the story.

Athelstan was born in about 894, the eldest son of King Edward and grandson of Alfred the Great. Shortly after becoming King, Edward remarried and had further sons, whilst Athelstan was sent to Mercia to live with his aunt Aethelflaed, who was to be highly influential in the development of the future King.



Edward died in July 924, having reconquered East Anglia and taken over Mercia following his sister's death but the succession was unclear, with Athelstan taking Mercia but his younger brother Aelfweard being supported in Wessex. However, when Aelfweard also died in July 924, the path became clear for Athelstan to become ruler of both Wessex and Mercia. He was crowned in Kingston **on 4 September 925**.



By the time of his death at Gloucester in 939, Athelstan had secured his position as the most senior leader in Britain, both through deft diplomacy and the formidable military leadership that culminated in the decisive battle of Brunanburh in 937. He was buried at Malmesbury Abbey, having reigned for only 14 years and was mourned as having died too early.

Athelstan's memory lives on in Kingston, whether in the Coronation Stone, reputedly used in the Coronation of at least three Saxon Kings, the names of our schools or in artworks and architectural adornments across the borough. Our Kingston 2025 celebrations come 100 years after the borough celebrated the millennium of King Athelstan's coronation with considerable interwar civic pageantry. They will show a place that has diversified and developed in ways that our forebears could not have imagined, but with a pride in its culture and heritage that they would recognise and appreciate.

Kingston was already a royal estate and had been the location for a major council meeting in 838. More importantly and symbolically it stood at the boundary of Wessex and Mercia. Many of the noblemen in Wessex opposed Athelstan's rule because he was strongly associated with Mercia. By choosing Kingston for his coronation, Athelstan was signifying the joining of the two kingdoms under one ruler. This coronation was also significant as it introduced a new form of service which for the first time included the use of a crown rather than the traditional helmet, a replica of which can be seen in All Saints Church, Kingston. The ceremony in Kingston was also the first use of the royal symbols of a ring, a sword and a sceptre that are still familiar to us today and played the same key role in the Coronation of King Charles III.
